

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

2ND FORM DOOR DECORATION PROJECT

Undoubtedly, the Christmas season is one of the most cherished seasons in the Catholic church. as it marks the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ. During this time of reflection and appreciation for our Lord. Christians worldwide typically decorate their homes with a nativity scene as a visual reminder of the reason for the season. The nativity scene is a symbolic visual representation of the birth of Jesus Christ. usually displaying the baby Jesus. the Virgin Mary. and Joseph surrounded by animals in a manger. Some scenes even include the shepherds. angels. and the three Wise Men. who visited the newborn Savior. which symbolizes the unity of heaven and earth. This practice can be dated back to St. Francis of Assisi in the year 1223 when he created the very first nativity scene to help people better understand and connect with the birth of Jesus Christ.

According to Catholic Traditions. the history behind the nativity scene begins with Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem following an order from the Roman emperor that a census be taken in their hometown. After several days of traveling while pregnant on a donkey. Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem. where they were informed that all the inns were full. Realizing that Mary would give birth at any moment. the owner of an inn informed Joseph they could stay in his stable. It was here in this stable that the baby Jesus was born. This story remains in the hearts and minds of Christians worldwide. especially during Christmas.

This year. SCA incorporated this cherished tradition in a new and interactive way to add to the school's Christmas spirit and allow students to further engage in their spirituality. Each 2nd form class was tasked to decorate a door demonstrating the nativity scene and its importance. All five classes showed outstanding efforts and displayed teamwork. creativity. and a deep understanding of their theme. creating beautifully decorated doors that remind us of the true reason for the season. This activity gave each class a chance to showcase their unique understanding and creative abilities while reflecting on the spiritual significance of their doors.

Jesse Trees

Definition:

Inspired by Faith

The Jesse Tree is a symbolic representation of Jesus Christ's genealogy, based on the prophecy of Isaiah 11:1: "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit." It is a visual way to depict the lineage of Christ through the stories of the Bible, beginning with creation and tracing through significant figures and events that lead to the birth of Jesus. Traditionally, a Jesse Tree is decorated with ornaments that represent these biblical stories, each day of Advent

focusing on one story and its corresponding symbol.

Purpose:

• Teach Salvation History: The Jesse Tree provides a way to reflect on and teach the biblical story of salvation, helping individuals and families connect Old Testament events and figures to the coming of Christ.

• Prepare for Christmas: It serves as a spiritual tool to prepare hearts for the celebration of Jesus' birth by emphasizing the fulfillment of God's promises.

• Create Family Traditions: The Jesse Tree fosters meaningful Advent traditions, encouraging prayer, scripture reading, and reflection together.

Highlights:

• Biblical Symbolism: Each ornament on the Jesse Tree represents a biblical figure or story (e.g., an apple for Adam and Eve, a rainbow for Noah, a ladder for Jacob).

• Daily Reflection: During Advent, families read a scripture passage corresponding to the symbol and reflect on its connection to the story of Christ.





SCA STANDS IN Solidarity with Ocean Academy

On November 29, a tragic accident shook our community. A van carrying members of Ocean Academy's male basketball team was involved in a severe crash while en route to a basketball tournament in Orange Walk Town. The accident, caused by a tire blowout, left the occupants with serious injuries and rippled through the hearts of many across Belize.

For Saint Catherine Academy, this accident felt especially close to home. Many of our students and staff share direct or indirect connections with the victims—whether as family members or friends. Beyond personal ties, the accident serves as a stark reminder of the shared risks we face as a school that frequently travels with students on buses and vans for various activities.

Every day, our own students commute to SCA using buses, vans, and even boats. In recent weeks, River Valley residents have faced additional challenges, having to rely on a river ferry before transferring to buses or private vehicles to reach school. This shared experience of navigating Belize's roads and waterways underscores the importance of safety and vigilance in our daily lives.

In response to this tragedy and the rising number of traffic accidents, SCA rallied to show support. The school organized a casual day, where students and staff could dress down in exchange for donations. All proceeds from this initiative were contributed to assist the Ocean Academy crash victims.

Through this gesture, SCA not only extended a helping hand but also affirmed its commitment to standing in solidarity with all those affected by this heartbreaking incident. Let us continue to keep the victims, their families, and our broader community in our prayers as we work together to ensure safer journeys for everyone.
